We intend to give the third issue of 2026 the title "Crises," hence we encourage you to submit original articles dealing with this theme by the end of December 2025.

The Fourth Industrial Revolution and AI, war in Europe, geopolitical tensions, and growing social inequalities are all contributing to a complex and crisis-ridden context for the creation, application, and interpretation of law. Constructive criticism of both newly emerging law and long-standing legal frameworks is essential in such circumstances.
